5. Presentation and Language

- Write legibly, use neat handwriting, and avoid excessive cross-outs.
- Use simple, formal, and precise language. Avoid jargon and overly complex sentences.
- Use keywords, underline or highlight important points to catch the examiner's attention.

6. Balanced and Multi-dimensional Approach

- Provide balanced arguments presenting different perspectives when required.
- Take a 360-degree approach to the topic to showcase depth of understanding.



How should I prioritize subjects and topics in my study plan

Here's how you should prioritize subjects and topics in your UPSC Mains study plan for maximum efficiency and score:

1. Focus on High-Weightage Subjects and Core Topics

Prioritize Polity, History, Economy, Environment, and Ethics, as these consistently carry significant weight across GS papers and help cover a large portion of the scoring area.

Analyze previous years' question patterns to spot frequently repeated topics (e.g., Governance and Polity in GS-II, Economy in GS-III, Ethics case studies in GS-IV).

2. Adopt a Paper-Wise and Thematic Approach

GS Paper High-Priority Topics

- GS I Modern Indian History, World History, Indian Society, Geography, Art and Culture
- GS II Indian Polity, Governance, International Relations, Social Justice
- GS III Indian Economy, Environment, Science & Tech, Internal Security, Disaster Management
- GS IV Ethics, Integrity, Case Studies, Aptitude

The Essay paper covers broad and current issues; practice by writing essays on recent socio-political, environmental, and philosophical themes.

3. Give Priority Based on Your Strengths and Weaknesses

Assess your comfort with each subject and allocate more initial time to weaker or unfamiliar topics, while maintaining scheduled revision for strong areas.

Use foundation sources (e.g., NCERT), then move to advanced resources for weak areas.

4. Integrate Current Affairs

Dynamic sections (Economy, International Relations, Polity, Environment) need you to link static knowledge with current developments. Dedicate daily time to newspapers and monthly compilations for these subjects.

5. Balance Optional and General Studies Preparation

Don't neglect your optional—allocate specific slots weekly based on its overlap with GS papers. Prioritize completing your optional syllabus early, then keep time for answer writing practice.

6. Revision and Practice

Continuously revise high-yield topics while interspersing with answer writing sessions and tests, focusing first on must-cover areas, then on more peripheral topics.
